Efficiently and Effectively Disseminating Your Research Results

In my column for the spring *PRN Report*, I briefly introduced implementation science (IS) and implementation research (IR). That short synopsis was meant to (1) clarify any muddy points regarding the rapidly developing field of IS and (2) encourage ACCP PRN members to consider applying key IS principles to their clinical pharmacy practices and, hopefully, explore opportunities to conduct valid and worthwhile IR on the important evidence-based practices, programs, and policies they are establishing or revising. Optimistically, ACCP's official journal, *Pharmacotherapy*, will soon receive publishable manuscript submissions that incorporate IS!

This column now focuses on a necessary companion to IR—dissemination science. Dissemination specifically refers to the "communication of research results to specific audiences (e.g., patients, care providers, hospital leadership, policy-makers) in order for these stakeholders to make more informed decisions that ultimately lead to improved patient outcomes." One of the chief contributors to the temporal gap between generating scientifically rigorous research findings and usable research findings is the lack of a strategic and effective dissemination plan (DP). A DP is an intentional and coordinated set of activities that aims to deliver key messages to targeted audiences and stakeholders. Indeed, detailed DPs are now a requisite component of virtually all funding opportunity announcements and requests for proposals/ applications from federal and private foundation funding entities. Scientific review teams and study sections critically evaluate the DP and consider it an important part of the overall merit of a proposal/application.

An effective DP has several key components. Readers are encouraged to learn about each component on their own to better understand the concepts. The Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality has produced an excellent tool to assist researchers in developing their DP.²

Developing an Effective Dissemination Strategy

Merely choosing a single journal in which to publish research findings is a necessary but insufficient mechanism for disseminating information. Indeed, developing an effective dissemination strategy is crucial because it ensures a comprehensive and efficient overall approach to disseminating research findings. Such strategies address vital elements like dissemination goals, barriers to dissemination, audiences/stakeholders for the information, and available budgeted resources. Performing this crucial step will likely yield the most value for the time and effort spent.

Leveraging Partnerships, Collaborations, and Alliances

Very rarely does any single cadre of researchers have the ability to reach all target audiences on their own. Often, therefore, investigators must collaborate with other groups to reach all of their stakeholders by a variety of media. Examples can include professional organizations (including ACCP PRNs), patient and caregiver support groups, churches and religious organizations, and other health care clinicians. Creativity and comprehensiveness in determining key partnerships are critically important.

Determining the Key Messages

Researchers must translate all of their data into cogent information that yields just a few discrete key messages. These messages must be in a comprehensible language that is appropriate for varied audiences (e.g., patients, clinicians, administrators, and policy-makers). The media through which these messages are delivered are also important. Examples include traditional journals and presentation forums, print and television media, Internet blogs, and social media forums.

Evaluating the Effectiveness of the DP

Akin to the wisdom in determining the validity of a quality improvement step is always determining whether a given DP has indeed attained its intended goals during the process or after it is carried out. One should evaluate "intermediate" outcomes, such as the proportions of target audiences who received the key messages, as well as "terminal" outcomes, like the proportion of patients who successfully received the evidence-based practice, program, or policy.

In summary, implementation researchers must strategically develop a comprehensive and effective DP for their research findings so that the findings may optimally be adopted by end users, thus ensuring that end users' health care interventions ultimately improve patients' health. I strongly encourage all ACCP PRN members to devote as much of their attention and effort to the sciences of dissemination and implementation as they give to developing evidence-based practices.

Perioperative Care PRN

Introduction

The Perioperative Care PRN was established in October 2014 to provide education and resources related to the overall treatment of perioperative patients, address the regulatory requirements imposed by accrediting bodies, and provide a place for members to discuss complicated perioperative patients and seek input and recommendations on care.

How the Challenge Works

The ACCP-PAC PRN Challenge will determine which PRN provides the greatest PAC support. PRN members who make a PAC contribution online will be given an option to designate a PRN to receive credit for their contribution.

- This year, the challenge will recognize two winners:

 - The PRN with the highest percentage of members who contribute to the PAC

Who Receives ACCP-PAC Support?

ACCP members who contribute to the PAC may recommend candidates to receive contributions. All PAC contributor recommendations will be considered; however, we may not accommodate all requests. The ACCP-PAC Governing Council must approve all candidate contributions.

As a federal committee, ACCP-PAC can only contribute to candidates who are running for federal office (candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives or U.S. Senate, not candidates for state legislatures or gubernatorial races).

CMMI's Enhanced MTM Pilot

Earlier in July, ACCP participated in a 2-day consensusbuilding meeting and follow-up conversations regarding the anticipated launch of the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Innovation's (CMMI's) enhanced MTM (EMTM) pilot (https://innovation.cms.gov/initiatives/enhancedmtm/). The meeting, sponsored by AMCP, PQA, and the Public Health Improvement Training (PHIT) Collaborative, sought to develop consensus definitions for MTM-related terms and subsequently map them to SNOMED-CT codes for use in electronic health records. Partly because of the perceived shortcomings of existing MTM services under Medicare Part D, EMTM intends to engage practices and practitioners to realize better outcomes for Medicare beneficiaries. Within this pilot, CMMI will track data at a more granular level, including practice site (e.g., within a pharmacy vs. within a medical practice), practitioner type (e.g., pharmacist, technician, other health care provider), and clinical outcomes. The EMTM pilot will launch in January 2017.

Pharmacogenomics and the Pharmacy HIT Collaborative Council

In August, ACCP staff presented for the quarterly meeting of the Pharmacy Health Information Technology (HIT) Collaborative Council regarding the implementation of pharmacogenomics and considerations for clinical pharmacy practice. This panel discussion, convened by the PHIT Collaborative, included Dr. Jon White, deputy national coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC), and Dr. Summerpal Kahlon, director, Care Innovation for Oracle Health Sciences Global Business Unit. The discussion predominantly focused on large-scale challenges to—and opportunities for—pharmacogenomics implementation in our rapidly evolving health and health IT landscape. The PHIT Collaborative expects to increase the activity and focus for pharmacogenomics and precision medicine in the coming months.

ACCP Joins with Eight Other Professional Pharmacist Organizations to Endorse Prescription Drug User Fee Reauthorization

Working as part of the Pharmacy Stakeholders Group, a coalition of 15 organizations representing pharmacists and pharmacies, ACCP submitted a letter to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in support of the reauthorization of the Prescription Drug User Fee Act (PDUFA) for fiscal years 2018–2022.

PDUFA is the mechanism through which the FDA collects fees from drug manufacturers to fund the new drug approval process. Under PDUFA, the FDA collects a substantial application fee from drug manufacturers when a New Drug Application (NDA) or Biologics License Application (BLA) is submitted, with those funds designated for use only in Center for Drug Evaluation and Research (CDER) or Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research (CBER) drug approval activities.

By law, PDUFA must be reauthorized every 5 years. In the letter, we applauded the FDA for its continued commitment to protect the public health by ensuring the safety and efficacy of medications in the United States and for its consideration of the evolution of health care as it contemplates the next 5 years. Specifically, we highlighted the following provisions in PDUFA reauthorization:

- Enhancing Use of Real-world Evidence for Use in Regulatory Decision-Making
- Enhancing the Incorporation of the Patient's
 Voice in Drug Development and Decision-Making
 Advancing Postmarketing Drug Safety Evaluation
 Through Expansion of the Sentinel System and
 Integration into FDA Pharmacovigilance Activities

In Case You Missed It ... ACCP's Government and Professional Affairs Department Advocacy Update

Building on the successful <u>Congressional Briefing</u> ACCP facilitated on behalf of Representatives Erik Paulsen (R-MN) and Peter Welch (D-VT), titled "'Getting the Medications Right': An Essential Ingredient in Achieving the Goals of H.R. 4878 – The Medicare Better Care, Lower Cost Act," the following summarizes some of the activities ACCP's Government and Professional Affairs staff engaged in over the summer:

ACCP Comments to CMS on Medicare Payment Reform

ACCP submitted comments to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) related to the implementation of the Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act of 2015 (MACRA). MACRA was established to reform the existing Medicare fee-for-service (FFS) payment model that encourages volume in the delivery of health care and drives up health care costs while providing little incentive for the coordinated, high-quality, team-based, patient-centered process of care that is necessary to protect the long-term structural and financial viability of the Medicare program.

Under MACRA, CMS will initiate a new Merit-Based Incentive Payment System (MIPS) for eligible clinicians or group practices beginning in 2019, including a combined value-based payment program that assesses the performance of each eligible provider according to quality, resource use, clinical practice improvement activities, and meaningful use of certified electronic health record technology. The law also creates incentives for participation in certain alternative payment models (APMs), an approach consistent with the administration's broader goals of moving more FFS payments into APMs that focus on better care, smarter spending, and healthier people.

In the comments letter, ACCP urged the administration to incorporate the direct patient care services of clinical pharmacists as members of the patient's health care team. Specifically, identifying essential objectives for a modernized, cost-effective, and quality-focused Medicare program, the comments focused on:

- Facilitating clinical pharmacists' full integration into patient care teams
- Achieving clinical outcomes to meet quality metrics by recognizing clinical pharmacists' contributions in quality and clinical practice improvement activity ("CPIA") performance measures
- Developing health information technology (HIT) resources to optimize the exchange of clinical information among members of the health care team

ACCP is confident that its Medicare Initiative is consistent with the overall structure of the agency's proposed reformed payment approach, and the College believes that the physician payment reform process offers an opportunity to integrate coverage for CMM services within the evolving Medicare program.

In addition to regular BoR activities, the BoR set aside time to update and report on progress made to the College's Strategic Plan, which was adopted in 2013. In conjunction with the meeting, the BoR hosted a reception titled "A Celebration of Collaboration" for the leadership of some of the organizations ACCP works with on a range of initiatives related to the College's advocacy agenda. Attendees included groups representing physicians and other health professionals, groups focused on advancing team-based care practices and APMs, ACCP colleague organizations from the pharmacy profession, and a variety of health policy stakeholders. The event, which was a resounding success, will serve to strengthen and develop the relationships ACCP has worked to build as part of its commitment to team-based, patient-centered care.

ACCP Welcomes 2016–2017 Congressional Healthcare Policy Fellow

The 2016–2017 ACCP/American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP)/Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) Congressional Healthcare Policy Fellow, Mary Abdelmalak, joined ACCP's Washington office in July after spending a week at the Brookings Institution. Abdelmalak then spent August working with the policy staff at ASHP. In September, she began her placement

as a staff member for Senator Charles Grassley (R-IA). Grassley chairs the Senate Judiciary Committee and is a senior member of the Senate Finance Committee, which oversees the Medicare program. Grassley is widely admired on Capitol Hill for his leadership on health care issues and his willingness to work in a bipartisan manner to advance legislation.

ACCP CLINICAL RESEARCH CHALLENGE: A NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR EXCELLENCE

ACCP Expands Scope of CRC Student Competition



ACCP is pleased to announce the return of the Clinical Research Challenge (CRC). This novel competition is targeted toward pharmacy students in the first 2 years of their first professional pharmacy degree program (P1 and P2 students for 4-year programs; P1 and

P2 students for 3-year accelerated programs and the first two professional years of 0–6 or 0–7 year programs). Critically evaluating and applying primary literature is an essential skill for clinical pharmacists. Research and scholarship contributes to improved health outcomes for patients and advances in the profession of clinical pharmacy. This innovative and unique competition offers teams of three pharmacy students the chance to participate in an online journal club and the opportunity to submit a clinical research proposal. NEW this year is the addition of a Letter of Intent round (more below). Plan now to participate in 2017.

Competition Overview

The ACCP CRC is a team-based competition. Teams of three students will compete against teams from other

schools and colleges of pharmacy nationwide in an online format. All eligible teams will have the opportunity to compete in round 1: Online Journal Club. Only one team per institution may enter the competition. Institutions with branch campuses, distance satellites, or more than one interested team are encouraged to conduct a local competition.

Teams achieving the top 40 scores after round 1 will advance to the **newly created round 2: Letter of Intent Submission**. In the event of any ties, the top 40 scores will be determined by the time required to complete the online journal club exam. All examinations will be time stamped. Time spent viewing instructional pages will NOT count toward total examination time.

The LOI Submission round, added to allow greater participation throughout the CRC, is intended to help students refine any future full-proposal submissions and allow the CRC Review Panel the ability to select teams to submit full proposals according to the innovativeness and quality of their LOI submissions.

Each year, the Competition Oversight Panel will issue a request for proposal to address a clinically focused research question on a select pharmacotherapeutic topic or disease state (e.g., nephrology, infectious disease, hypertension). Eligible teams will first submit an LOI based on the research question. Teams will then be provided information regarding the research environment, which will include a specified budget and a timeline in which the proposed research must be completed. Thereafter, eligible teams will have 2½ weeks to develop and submit an LOI online following the criteria outlined here.

Teams achieving the top 20 scores after the LOI round will be advanced to round 3: Research Protocol Design and invited to submit a complete research proposal.

Teams will be notified by e-mail regarding their status to participate in round 3 by Friday, March 17, 2017 (CST). Proposals are due by Friday, April 14, 2017 (CST) at midnight. For more information on round 3: Research Protocol Design, click here.

The teams with the top three research proposal submissions are requested to present their research design during a poster session at the 2017 ACCP Annual Meeting in Phoenix, Arizona. In addition, each member of said teams will receive a complimentary Annual Meeting registration and a cash prize. Click here for additional prize information.

Students are not required to be members of ACCP to participate. Team registration should be submitted online and must be initiated by a current faculty member at the respective institution. Students interested in forming a team should contact their ACCP faculty liaison. If no ACCP faculty liaison has been identified, another faculty member from the institution may initiate the registration

process. The registering faculty member must confirm the eligibility of all team members online before a team will be permitted to compete in the CRC. The deadline to complete team registration and confirm eligibility is February 1, 2017.
